

Mike's Column

High Demand for Quality Staff

I think it is obvious to everyone that demand for staff is at an all time high and DISCO is being regularly approached by businesses looking for new team members. It has become obvious to me that, regrettably, the support and mentoring available to assist young people to transition into new entry level opportunities is now sadly lacking in workplaces. I don't blame businesses for this problem, but it is having an impact on the ability for workers to successfully transition into a new role. In my opinion, a workplace mentor or supporter is vital to help make a new team member feel welcome and comfortable as they start learning about their role and their duties. In recent times I have dealt with the frustration of business owners and managers who have become frustrated that young people don't just quickly get 'up to speed'. The fact is that for many young people, who are often commencing in their very first job, have to make a substantial adjustment to meet the expectations of an employer whilst getting used to the routine of work and how to actually develop themselves successfully in a workplace. I would like to remind new and prospective employers that taking a little more time at the beginning and providing support to aid the new worker will pay benefits in the long run. Its important for those supporting new staff to remember how difficult it was for them on their first day and by accommodating and supporting new workers this directly impacts on employment longevity and the development and success of that new team member over time.

Recently, to support young migrants and refugees in the Toowoomba community, DISCO lodged a funding application in early October with the Queensland Government. This application, the **Migrant and Refugee Youth Support Program (MaRYS)** may be funded through the *Skilling Queenslanders for Work* initiative with DISCO hoping to find out if it has been successful in early December this year. If successful, DISCO looks forwards to assisting more than 30 young migrants and refugees into employment or further training during 2023.



Recently the organisation finalised its Annual Report for 2021/22 period with this document to be tabled for approval and public release at DISCO's Annual General Meeting on the 14th of November. This year the meeting will be held at DISCO's Gatton site, and I would like to extend an invitation to the friends of DISCO to attend. During the development of this document this year, I have been reminded of the work we have achieved and would like to acknowledge and thank all DISCO team members and the volunteers who help assist and guide the organisation to be successful. We started our second semester on the 18th of July with 9 students and it's hard to believe we only have five weeks until graduation. From working hard and stretching our brains to get our units completed, participating in several personal development and industry focus sessions, to finishing work readiness modules and activities our semester two 2022 cohort are gaining the skills and experiences needed to be successful in the workforce. We have also been lucky enough to welcome Trent back to teach some Indigenous art and have had the Australian Defence Force educate us on the many career options available in the military, tried our hand at cooking, and tested our athletic abilities with Basketball and Beach Volleyball. It is so wonderful to see how each young person has grown throughout this semester.

We have also completed our 12 weeks post program support for our past 7 participants from the semester one group. This post-program support has resulted in high levels of work and study outcomes for the group. We are very proud of how this group have knuckled down to move their careers and themselves forward. Great job semester one!

We attended the Faith Lutheran and Laidley High Careers Expo in August, and it was such a pleasure meeting so many young people and talking to them about their futures. It is such a privilege to continue to partner with our local schools to support and offer alternatives to our young people.

YES Program

It is truly hard to believe that we are almost at the end of 2022 but what an incredible year it has been, particularly for the YES Program. The past few months have seen many successes from YES participant's as young people across the Toowoomba, Gatton and Dalby regions have been engaging and working hard towards achieving their employment goals.

Through the YES Program, young people have been provided the opportunity to develop their job searching skills and their confidence. This has been achieved through a collaborative process which focuses on enhancing their professional resume and cover letter writing skills, interview preparation, and career planning abilities. Additionally, YES participants demonstrated an enthusiasm towards working on other core skills to support their job searching and personal development needs including budgeting, management, problem-solving and value identification activities. This has gone to show the individualised nature of the program looks at young people's overall development and what they might need support around to achieve their goals which has resulted in many great successes for the 2022 YES participants.

Since the middle of the year, I have been focussing on expanding the program further in a variety of ways. This includes supporting the coordination of the School Leaver Presentation's that are conducted throughout the middle and end of the school year for the Grade 12's before they commence their transitions into the workforce. In addition to this, Mike and I both were present at the Harristown State High School's Career Expo back in August where we also got an opportunity to expand upon our networks with other services and got to meet some of the Grade 12 students before our scheduled presentation in November. Consequentially, this has opened many opportunities and conversations with stakeholders, networks and young people to expand the YES program further in 2023.

One more final note is to share a fantastic resource that's commonly used within the one-on-one sessions with YES participants. It is the SEEK Free Career Planner template https://www.seek.com.au/career-advice/article/5-steps-to-your-future-career-planner

This resource provides YES participant's with a visual and physical product that allows them to map out their career plan which we construct together throughout our appointments. It also offers room for different career ideas to help young people problem-solve and weighup which direction they might want to move towards. Our current Get Set for Workers will graduate with an RSA, Food Safety, Barista and First Aide certificates as well as a White Card, *Certificate II in Skills for Work and Vocational Pathways* and a Tenancy Skills Training certificate.

Their resumes are looking great, and they are now able to add the skills attained at our recent Bunnings Sausage Sizzle which now include Customer Service, Cash Handling and Food Preparation.

It's been a very busy time for this cohort and have 5 weeks until our Graduation on the 1st of December.

I have been in contact and made bookings with schools from Dalby, Tara, Chinchilla and Miles to participate in our annual Year 12 School Leaver presentations. This will enable us to make contact with these students in March next year to ensure that they have successfully transitioned into the workforce or moved into further education.

After 12 weeks of support from our team, the semester 1 group has achieved some great outcomes. Fifteen out of 16 participants have either gained employment or returned to school or study. We are so proud and enjoyed a lovely catch up with the group over the holidays.

My name is Lara Smith, and I am the Get Set for Work Coordinator at the Dalby office.

My working life began by cleaning hotel rooms and repairing textbooks in my school holidays to make some pocket money. When I was 15 years old, I scored my first part time job being a 'checkout chick' at Coles Dalby. I graduated grade 12 in 2016, unsure where I was meant to be in this big world, but I was so keen to get out there and see what I could make of it all. I applied for the DISCO Traineeship advertised and was lucky enough to be chosen for an interview. Unfortunately, I was unsuccessful, but I did not let that stop me. I worked at the local criterion pub in town for the first 3 months while I decided my next step. After this short lived yet eye-opening experience, I then stepped out of my comfort zone and gained a fulltime job at the Countrywide Saddlery and Clothing store where I learnt everything you'll ever need to know about horse's (might I add that I have never been near a horse in my life), working with clothing wholesalers and equine equipment. I worked as a Retail Assistant in this small family business for over 3 years. Although it was good fun, I did not feel as though I was fulfilling my potential as I have always wanted a career in helping people. Early in 2020, I saw that DISCO was advertising for a Youth Worker Traineeship. Without hesitation, I tried my luck again putting forward my best possible Cover Letter and Resume. After not giving up on my dream job I finally got my foot in the door. Receiving the phone call that I had been offered the traineeship is a moment I will remember forever. I have worked for DISCO since March 2020. I began as a trainee in the Transition to Work Program where I worked before, I was offered the position as the Get Set for Work Trainee. By the end of 2020, I had completed my Certificate III in Community Services and became a qualified Youth Worker. I supported many coordinators delivering the Get Set for Work program and recently was offered the opportunity to step into the role of Get Set for Work Coordinator myself.
