#### **Contact with 2022 School Leaver Graduates**

As I write my first column for 2023, we have commenced our school leaver support program by contacting many of the region's graduates. This involves the organisation ringing more than 2,000 school leavers who exited schools across Toowoomba, the Western Downs and the Lockyer Valley last year.

It is evident from the early contact that a large number of young people have found it much easier in 2023 to obtain work with many young people working 38 hours in various roles and a large number are studying at University, TAFE or a private training organisation. Many are holding down more than one job and working across a range of employment sectors.

I look forward to reviewing the overall statistics and I expect that we will see a steady stream of young people coming into our office to seek support to help them move forward successfully. These details can be passed onto all eligible schools, by contacting our office.

We are currently developing some marketing to recognise DISCO's achievement of reaching 25 years in business. We were extremely grateful to have received some hygiene packs kindly donated by Kim and Tracey, two members of the Gatton Police Station. The donation was distributed to our Get Set for Work clients during a hygiene lesson. The ladies have taken it upon themselves to put together some DV Crisis packs to assist vulnerable women and have now expanded their assistance to vulnerable children and men. All the items are paid for by Kim and Tracey, or donated by friends, family or community members. A big thank you to Kim and Tracey for the great work they're doing. One of our aims for this year is to have more guest speakers as part of our Get Set for Work program and we are off to a great start. We have had Paul and Georgia from Anglicare, Matt from MAS, David from Stanbroke, BEST Harvest trail and our first visits from the team at Aurora. We have had such a great start to our program in term one and we are excited and looking forward to what term two brings.

## **YES Program**

It is hard to believe 2023 is already tearing by and it never ceases to amaze me how quick the year goes. The YES Program has started off strongly with many young people reaching out early to get support to achieve their employment goals.

Through the YES Program, young people have been provided with the opportunity to identify their career goals and develop their job searching skills and confidence. This is achieved through the collaborative nature of the one-on-one support which assists young people to develop or enhance their professional resume and cover letter writing skills, interview preparation, and career planning abilities. Additionally, YES participant's thus far have emphasised the importance of building their teamwork, communication, problem solving and critical thinking skills, which are all vital to possess in the modern employment market. This is done through the provision of information and engaging in short activities to help practice and develop these skills in a variety of contexts, both personal and professional.

The individualised nature of the program looks at young people's overall development and what they need support around to achieve their goals which has resulted in great outcomes for the 2023 YES participants to date.

The YES Program is expected to continue to grow post our annual School Leaver Program calls that we conduct at the end of March. I am meeting with many new and motivated young people who are ready to take the next step towards their career, which is absolutely incredible and inspiring in itself. This has also allowed me to become more present in various communities including the Dalby, Gatton and Oakey regions, and even allowed me the opportunity to connect with a variety of schools and businesses to assist YES participants now and in the future.

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## **Dalby Doings**

Welcome to 2023! I would like to welcome back Lara Smith in the role of Get Set for Work Co-ordinator for our 2023 program. Lara is being supported to deliver the program by Delaney Holder in the role of a Youth Support Officer. Delaney and Lara formed a formidable pair in delivering last year's program and the new program they have put together for this year looks just as good.

Our first Get Set for Work Program for 2023 commenced on the 13<sup>th</sup> of February with 10 participants. These young people are participating in career development, personal development, trade days and healthy lifestyles workshops whilst also completing a *Certificate II in Skills for Work and Vocational Pathways*. This program will finish on June the 22<sup>nd</sup> with our nest program for the year commencing in July. We are already receiving referrals for our next program.

Dana Sallway works in the Dalby office one day a week on the Ready for Work program, supporting 15-24-year-olds. The program assists young people to transition into the workforce by providing them with the practical skills they need to successfully find work. Ready for Work is a short program (up to 6-8 sessions duration) targeting young job seekers that lack the skills and/or knowledge to find employment.

If employed through our Get Set for Work or Ready for Work programs, we can support the employers in ensuring the young person becomes a valuable member of their team. We are also able to advise employers of possible funding incentives available (and who they can contact to discuss eligibility requirements) to help with the costs of training these young people. Did you know that many employers check your references <u>**BEFORE**</u> they decide if they are going to interview you? It's true!

This new trend started in the USA, and it has arrived in Australia. So why do this? Well, employers are very time poor with so many businesses desperately looking for staff. This change in strategy is about finding out from your referee first if you are worth speaking to. Many of the questions revolve around what you have done and why they consider you a good person. Our first group for 2023 is underway with 16 young people. The group is made up of some very active boys. This is keeping us very busy, and we have had to make sure we have incorporated activities to burn off some of that built up energy.

We have begun hosting different presenters in the program such as Kobi House, MAS Career Consultations and Catholic Care. We also loved having Emily Robinson conduct an Indigenous Art workshop with our group.

Our James Street team has been working together for nearly a year and have recently welcomed a school-based trainee, Deng Bol Malek, to the team who works Wednesday's, while completing year 11 at Saint Joseph's College Toowoomba and also his *Certificate III in Community Service* through Aurora Training Institute. Deng is already a valued member of the team who is very liked by our young people.

Our team is busy finishing off our first term with our first group and meeting many new faces in preparation for semester two which is very exciting. We are all looking forward to our Easter Holiday break to reset and recharge for a great term two


